IDRC Board of Governors visits IMCHA projects

IDRC's Board of Governors visited Innovating for Maternal and Child Health (IMCHA) projects in Tanzania and Uganda in July 2017.

In Tanzania, the governors, government officials, and researchers attended a round table on improving health equity. The governors learned how the focus of IMCHA is aligned with the Tanzanian government's priorities and practices. For



example, a project led by the Catholic University of Health and Allied Sciences, in collaboration with the University of Calgary, is implementing the government-backed MamaToto process— a low-cost program that strengthens services at health facilities and within communities to save mothers and children— in the Geita and Mwanza regions.

In Uganda, governors visited the Maganjo branch of BRAC in Kawempe. During the visit, they spoke with community health workers and mothers from the community who are seeking health services. The governors developed a greater understanding and appreciation of how community health workers are filling a critical gap in healthcare, particularly in maternal and child health — an important research area in the IMCHA initiative.

IMCHA mid-term evaluation will start this fall

The objectives of IMCHA's mid-term formative evaluation, which will begin this fall, are to assess the initiative's progress and to draw general lessons to improve it. The evaluation will examine various

dimensions of IMCHA research and implementation such as gender, equity, and collaboration between researchers and policymakers.

Improving maternal and child health policymaking processes in Nigeria

This article explores the main barriers to the use of evidence in maternal neonatal and child health policymaking in Nigeria. Findings highlight the inadequate capacity of research and policy organizations to conduct policyrelevant research and the lack of dialogue between researchers and policymakers. The research is part of the situational analysis of maternal and child health in West Africa conducted by the West African Health Organization.
